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PLAYWORKS AND THE RAVENS

With a generous grant from the Ravens All Community Team Foundation, SBCS has been delighted to welcome Playworks into our school this year. Playworks currently operates in two dozen elementary schools in Baltimore – bringing safe, inclusive, meaningful play to close to 10,000 City students before, during, and after school each and every school day. Playworks is based on the belief that play creates valuable opportunities for children to grow physically, mentally, emotionally and socially. Research shows that play is essential to a child’s development and an invaluable tool for improving school climate. When students engage in quality recess and playtime, they return to the classroom more focused and ready to learn.

Playworks places one full-time, well-trained adult “coach” at an urban school to teach and organize games and physical activities before, during, and after school. Playworks’ programs specifically work to engage kids who are not typically involved in play on the playground—those who do not feel safe, those who are intimidated or bullied, those who are overweight, and those who feel their skill level is not up to par. To the delight of the children, our coach plays too, which provides an element of fun as well as the opportunity to model appropriate behavior.

At SBCS, Playworks allows kids to “play” in five different ways: Recess, Class Game Time, Junior Coaching, After School Program and Sports Leagues. Each of these parts of the Playworks curriculum builds young people’s life skills, provides them with meaningful roles and leadership opportunities, and fosters supportive relationships with peers and adults.
